## **School Readiness Assessment**

## Results summary

Upon entering school in the fall, kindergarteners were assessed by their teachers using the Kindergarten Observation Form (KOF), a valid and reliable tool that captures children's social-emotional and cognitive readiness for kindergarten.

It captured children's readiness skills, as well as the factors most strongly associated with kindergarten readiness in the community.







# Children fully ready for kindergarten by building block







## Characteristics and experiences linked to readiness

In addition to child and family demographic characteristics, school readiness was predicted by several malleable assets, including early childhood education (ECE) attendance, coming to school well-rested and well-fed, and child resiliency.


#### **ECE Experience**

Also, although Latino boys had the lowest readiness scores overall, the presence of such malleable assets narrowed the readiness gap.
